

Block Technique Skill Builder

Supply list

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In this skill builder class, you will learn a variety of techniques that take you a step or two beyond basic patchwork methods you may already be familiar with. The project includes partial seam construction, cheater corners, a technique for foundation paper piecing with a re-usable foundation pattern and faced appliqué. In class, you will learn each technique on an individual block, afterwards you can make multiple blocks for a sampler if you wish, a pattern is included in the handout. The goal of this class is to provide you with more skills that will be applicable to future quilting projects.

Tools/Materials:

- **Fabric:** For the lesson exercises in the class, you will need 5-6 fat quarters of coordinating fabrics ranging from light to dark, plus a novelty print for The center circle. If you wish to make multiple blocks for a final sampler as presented in the handout, the amount of individual fabrics will depend upon which how many blocks you choose to make and whether you are planning to use a palette of a few fabrics for the entire quilt or a variety of different fabrics to play with gradations or a scrappy effect. For a scrappy effect, a dozen fat quarters of lots of different fabrics should be enough. If you wish to stick to 5-6 color selections, $\frac{1}{2}$ – $\frac{3}{4}$ yard pieces would be sufficient. The finished quilt will be more attractive if you use a variety of simple textured fabrics for the general blocks and prints or focal fabrics for featured points. Pick a special bold novelty print fabric for the center circle; it will be your main focal point. For the borders $\frac{1}{2}$ yard of a contrasting print that coordinates well with the other fabrics.
- **$\frac{1}{4}$ yard of lightweight interfacing:** this can be non-woven or a cotton product like Form-Flex or Shape-Flex.
- **Sewing machine:** With the basic accessories: extra needles, bobbins, etc.
- **Thread:** 100% cotton in colors similar to your fabrics.
- **Pins:** ordinary sewing pins
- **Rotary cutter, mat and ruler:** both a 9" (or larger) squaring ruler and a 6"x 24 ruler would be best
- **Freezer paper:** Available at supermarkets and some quilt shops, you will need a couple of feet or so.
- **Black 'Sharpie'™ brand pen:** you will need the regular (fine) point, not the ultra fine.
