FABRIC TREASURE BOXES

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These charming fabric boxes are easy to make in any size you desire and can fit a novelty print for the lid. In the class you will receive a pattern for three sizes but also the measurement formula to allow you to design future boxes to specific dimensions; you can even make sets of nesting boxes. Though you will make a basic fabric box in class, the instructor will cover ideas and tips on embellishing boxes. These make elegant gift boxes to present a gift, fill with chocolates or a special keepsake, or make the box itself a gift. They are remarkably durable too, I have been using one for my quilting safety pins for almost 20 years. Please note this project needs a sewing machine with a zipper foot. The case is stitched together by machine, but the final assembly will be done by hand.

TOOLS & MATERIALS:

- 2 Fat Quarters of cotton fabric: One will be for the outside of the box and the other for the lining.
- Motif print for lid: There is a choice of three box sizes. Choose a motif that will fit on a 3"x 3", 4"x 4", or 3"x 5" lid. Do not precut the motif fabric.
- Matching sewing thread
- **8"x 12" (approximate) piece of plain mat board:** Available at some craft supply shops and framing shops. This will be enough for 1-2 boxes depending upon box size. Many frame shops sell this smaller inexpensive size for do-it-yourself framing or you can ask if they have leftover pieces from their framing job. NOTE: make sure you get mat board; ordinary cardboard will not work! If you cannot find mat board you can use foam core board (1/8" thick) but the box will not be as strong or durable as a box made with mat board.
- 12"x 18" piece batting: Choose something thin and even such as Warm & Natural or Pellon Thermolite.
- Glue stick
- 1 decorative ½" button with a shank
- Cloth wrapped elastic hair tie (optional): Available in packages in hair care department of stores. Buy the thinner type with a bead on one end (this will be for an elastic closure). OR 1 skein of Perle Cotton in Size 5-8 (for a braided closure).
- Gallon-sized Zip-loc bag
- Several sheets of scrap paper: To protect work surface from glue.
- Freezer paper
- Sewing machine with a regular foot AND a zipper foot attachment: YOU ABSOLUTELY MUST HAVE A ZIPPER FOOT FOR THIS PROJECT.
- Sewing awl
- Scissors: You will need good fabric shears, embroidery scissors and everyday utility scissors (see note*)
- Cutting mat, rotary cutter and quilters' cutting ruler: an 11"x 17" mat and a 4"x 12" ruler should be fine.
- Mat or box knife with a sharp blade (absolutely necessary)

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- Hand sewing needles and pins
- Skewer, knitting needle: or some other similar tool for poking out the corners of fabric case after it's been turned.
- Seam ripper
- A bead, small tassel, or charm (optional): If you opt for a braided closure, you can add a dangle on the tie.
